Reflections from our Founding Director, *Canon Sarah Snyder*

Partner Gathering at Rose Castle

With key partners from across Cumbria and the UK

Rose Castle welcomed a diverse group of partners from Cumbria and across the UK to connect around current content development areas including the 12 Habits of a Reconciler and Scriptural Reasoning. Engaging input from diverse faith, ethnic, and cultural perspectives remains an important part of any new initiative for us, drawing on the expertise of our network as we seek to support our reconcilers. There was a shared agreement that these times of coming together as partners are a vital source of encouragement and strength - capacities are always stretched when working on the frontlines but taking time to share our learnings and align our efforts remains a priority if we are to keep peacebuilders at the heart of all we do.

With Strengthening Resilience and Countering Extremism

Religious leaders from Nigeria brought their contextual insights to a capacity building training at Rose Castle. Mapping exercises supported a strategy for engaging new agents in reconciliation efforts, especially focused on the extreme margins. The opportunity to connect with the context of Carlisle built friendships across national lines, sharing the challenge of being religious leaders who are holding pastorally sensitive spaces while embracing the opportunity to embed peacebuilding visions and practices within their communities and across their networks.

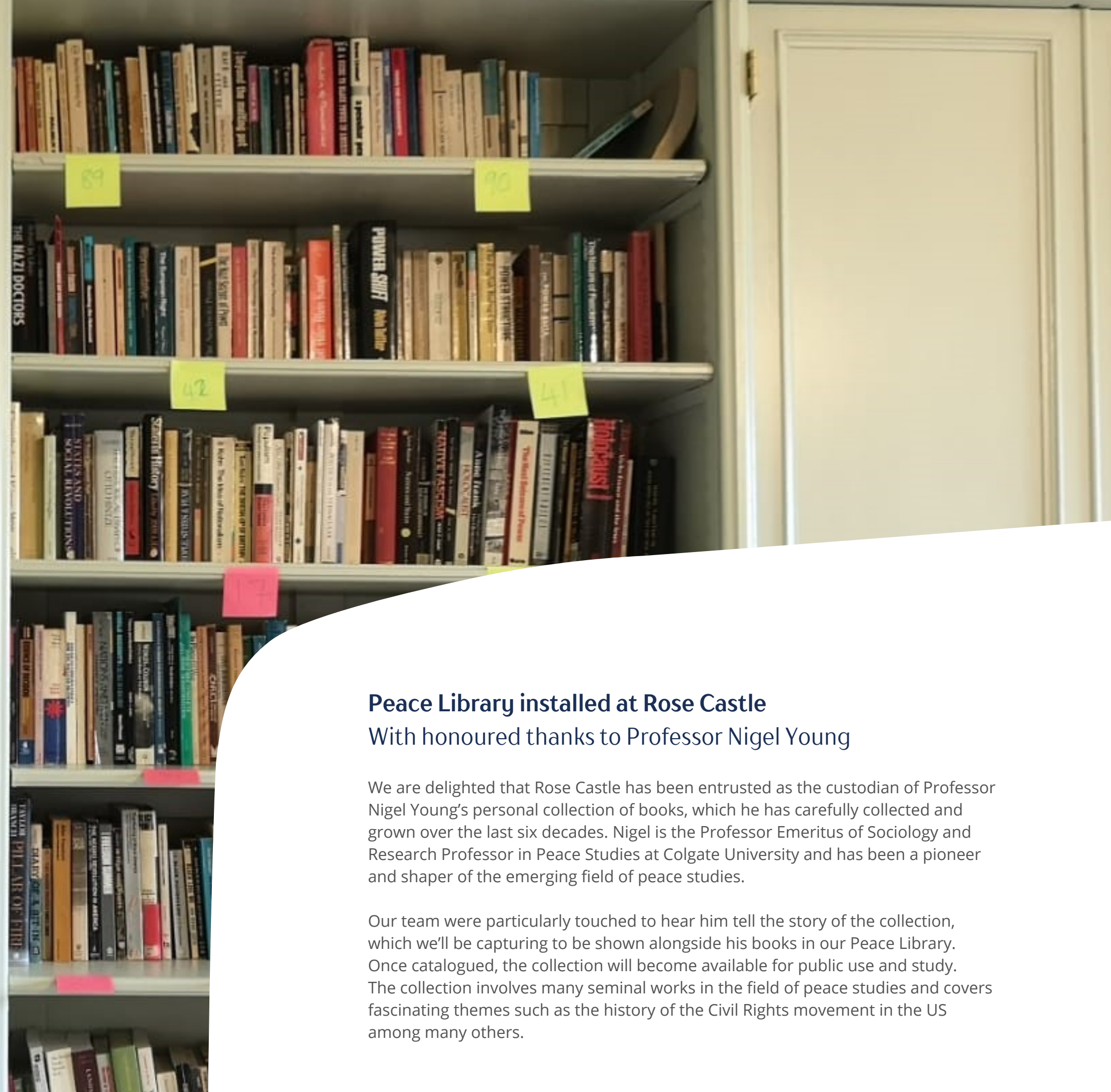

Peace Library installed at Rose Castle

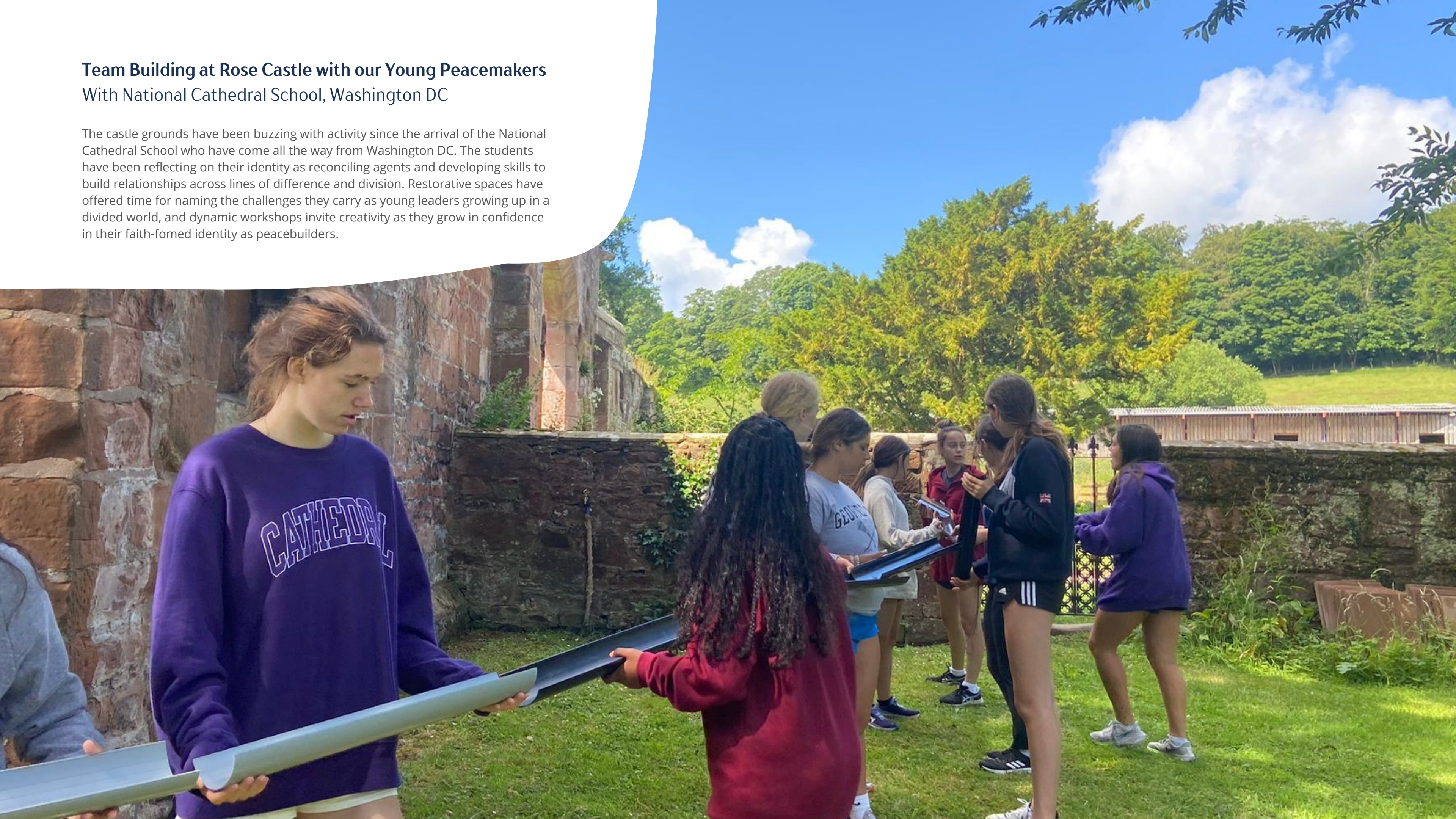
With honoured thanks to Professor Nigel Young

We are delighted that Rose Castle has been entrusted as the custodian of Professor Nigel Young's personal collection of books, which he has carefully collected and grown over the last six decades. Nigel is the Professor Emeritus of Sociology and Research Professor in Peace Studies at Colgate University and has been a pioneer and shaper of the emerging field of peace studies.

Our team were particularly touched to hear him tell the story of the collection, which we'll be capturing to be shown alongside his books in our Peace Library. Once catalogued, the collection will become available for public use and study. The collection involves many seminal works in the field of peace studies and covers fascinating themes such as the history of the Civil Rights movement in the US among many others.

The castle grounds have been buzzing with activity since the arrival of the National Cathedral School who have come all the way from Washington DC. The students have been reflecting on their identity as reconciling agents and developing skills to build relationships across lines of difference and division. Restorative spaces have offered time for naming the challenges they carry as young leaders growing up in a divided world, and dynamic workshops invite creativity as they grow in confidence in their faith-fomed identity as peacebuilders.

Women of Faith and Peacebuilding

With London School of Economics (LSE) Faith Centre

We had the privilege to partner with LSE Faith Centre to gather a group of 19 senior peacebuilders - inspirational women from Israel-Palestine and across the UK - to connect around the globalised Palestinian-Israeli conflict. The workshop explored the role of storytelling in conflict and provided an opportunity to learn from diverse perspectives, drawing on the rich wisdom and experiences in the room to reframe shared challenges and visions.

Scriptural Reasoning with Senior Faith Leaders

With Senior Faith Leaders Programme (SFLP)

Senior leaders brought the depths and differences of their scriptural traditions into dialogue through the practice of Scriptural Reasoning at the third module of the Senior Faith in Leadership Programme at Windsor Castle. The programme facilitates meaningful encounters between faith leaders, accessing the resources that each faith tradition provides for effective leadership. Scriptural Reasoning - the third pillar of the Rose Way - remains central to SFLP, and RCF continues to enjoy a close partnership with their team, with whom we have a long history of shared practice.

Christian Wisdom of Reconciliation Research Project

With Durham University, Centre for Catholic Studies

We are delighted to have commenced our 'Christian Wisdom of Reconciliation' research project with the Centre for Catholic Studies (CCS) at Durham University, made possible with a generous grant from the McDonald Agape Foundation. In this first collaboration with CCS, RCF team members were invited to share their thought leadership on faith-formed reconciliation in service of the global initiative launched by Pope Francis on 'synodality', a Catholic concept exploring how we live together wisely across difference. Senior representatives from seven major Christian denominations were present at this gathering, and expressed great interest both in RCF's work and in the Christian Wisdom of Reconciliation project, which aims to develop resources for fostering intra-Christian dialogue in settings of social division.

Forgiveness conference at Harvard University

This was the framing of the Templeton-hosted conference at Harvard University that welcomed interdisciplinary perspectives on forgiveness. We contributed to the discussion through the lens of cultivating a habit of forgiveness, and it was a good opportunity to share some of our most recent publications, including our 12 Habits of a Reconciler!

Churches across USA engage with 12 Habits of a Reconciler

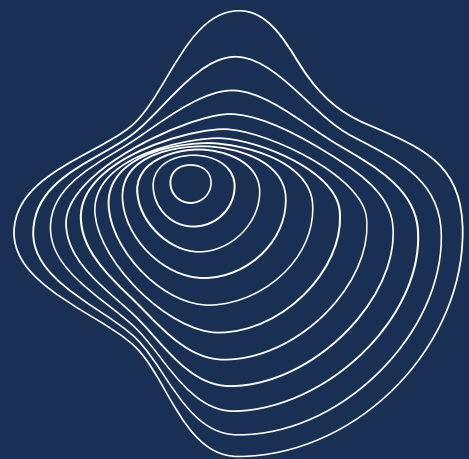

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Reconciler Hub

The Reconciler Hub is an essential tool for continuing to engage, upskill and mobilise our network for ongoing reconciling activity within their home contexts. With a growing resource library, regular virtual workshop opportunities and discussion forums, it is a fabulously designed and interactive space for our alumni and partners to develop and collaborate.

Scriptural Reasoning on the Hub

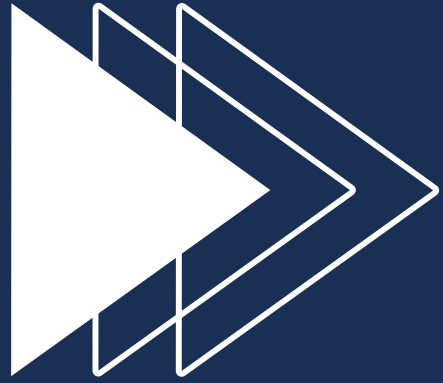
We run monthly Scriptural Reasoning sessions virtually on the hub, which is open for all members to sign up to. Our recent sessions have brought together participants from across the Abrahamic faiths and beyond, inviting diverse perspectives from different continents and contexts. Focused on thematic texts from each of the Abrahamic traditions, hub members practice the habit of curiosity as they ask questions of one another's scriptures and faith. Participants continue to find it a rich environment for deepening in their own faith while growing in understanding of different scriptural traditions. Friendships and collaborations are strengthened, even in this virtual setting, with the opportunity for discussions to continue through dedicated forum spaces on the hub.

Dialogue with Difference on the Hub

Dialogue with Difference is a monthly dialogue group where hub members openly share, discuss and explore topical issues related to the Habit of the Month. Our most recent habit has been Humility, with hub resources and sessions exploring how to cultivate humility in our everyday lives, through our peacebuilding practices, and in reconciliation processes.
